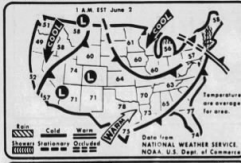

Cult Leader Gets 10-Year Sentence

WATKINS, Miss. (AP) — The leader of a Whitechapel religious cult has been sentenced to 10 years in prison after being convicted of kidnapping a Texas voter in 1975 and holding her captive on a farm commune near Rogers, Miss. Judge J. Edgar Jones, director of the 85-acre commune called the Church of Satan, was found guilty by a Webster County jury of directing the abduction of Cheryl Hill, 31, of Miami, Fla., in Jan. 1975 and holding her captive at the commune. She testified she was tied to chairs and beds and beaten. Her husband was freed on \$2,000 bond pending appeal. Circuit Court Judge Clarence E. Morgan Jr. handed down the sentence, saying Hill, though he did not know her, was called by the maximum penalty of 10 years in prison. "She is charged with and convicted of — the restraint of an American citizen without any right whatsoever — a very serious crime," Morgan said. Hill's profession of good intentions "did not justify her restraining Mrs. Hill without

Boteler to Be Sentenced June 20

GREENVILLE, Miss. (AP) — E.L. Boteler Jr., former director of the state Highway Department, faces sentencing June 20 after his conviction Wednesday night on all three charges filed against him in a federal court trial. The jury returned the guilty verdict at 10:30 p.m., one hour after receiving the case. The deliberations were interrupted only once, for an hour-long dinner break. The jurors convicted Boteler on two counts of transporting a total of \$750,000 in stolen securities across state lines and one count of falsifying his 1975 income tax returns. Boteler had testified he was purchasing himself the money and returning himself to the state.

stopped his authority to get federal funds to help Mississippi. However, he said Boteler was not a federal agent because he was getting \$25,000 of his own money, but was using funds from the treasury. "He's going to have to live with his conscience for the rest of his life, but we need a criminal," Fawcett said. Boteler testified during the eight-day trial that the money involved was actually his own, taken from state funds as reimbursement for funds loaned former Highway Commissioner Bernard Jumper for lobbying efforts. He said "they" had decided that by sending it to Washington, they could secure federal funds to pay for bridges on roads being cut by the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway new waterway construction. Jumper denied receiving any funds from Boteler, but said the Internal Revenue Service has furnished an investigation of his records because of published reports of Boteler's claims. Jumper said he never spoke with Boteler about protecting the Tennessee-Tombigbee project in Washington. Jumper also said he spent \$100,000 on his unsuccessful 1975 campaign for reelection but denied using any state funds in the campaign. Boteler was convicted in state court earlier this year of embezzling \$100,000 in state funds and he still faces charges

Capsule to Be Opened in 2075

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — The last act of Mississippi's bicentennial celebration has ended with the opening of a time capsule in Gov. Cliff Finch's office. The 30-inch aluminum cube will be opened July 4, 2075, on the nation's status in bicentennial observance. It will be stored at the grounds of the state Archives Building in Jackson. Among the items in the capsule are a Mississippi seal and Democratic and Republican presidential campaign buttons from the 1956 election, a number of Mississippi historical and other documents about the state. A state budget for fiscal year 1977 and a directory of state officials. Also included are local newspapers, bumper stickers, a highway map and a license plate. "As we look forward to the next 100 years, I don't want us to forget the last 100 years," said Finch. "I hope the values we cherish will still be shared in the year 2075." Governor of State Huber L. Foster, chairman of the Mississippi American Bicentennial Bicentennial Commission, presided at the ceremony closing the capsule.

"With the funds we had to work with, I think we were No. 1 in the nation in Bicentennial activities," Foster said. "I have never seen such enthusiasm in all communities in the state. In the past 100 years, we were No. 1 in involvement by Southerners in the state." Both Finch and Foster dropped letters to Americans of 2075 into the capsule, "I hope the values we cherish will still be shared in the year 2075." "I don't know if you're going to be here in 2075 to tell everybody what a great day this has been."
